Disease Prevention & Treatment

One of Rotary's seven areas of focus is *Disease Prevention and Treatment*. In addition to our flagship cause - eradicating polio - there are many other projects around the world that fall under this header.

Disease results in misery, pain, and poverty for millions of people worldwide. That's why treating and preventing disease is so important to us. We lead efforts both large and small. We set up temporary clinics, blood donation centers, and training facilities in underserved communities struggling with outbreaks and health care access. We design and build infrastructure that allows doctors, patients, and governments to work together.

Rotarians combat diseases like malaria, HIV/AIDS, Alzheimer's, multiple sclerosis, diabetes, and polio. Prevention is important, which is why we also focus on health education and bringing people routine hearing, vision, and dental care.

RAM-Global, the Rotary Action Group on Malaria, is taking Malaria work Rotary wide. The ultimate goal, just as with polio, is to eradicate

Rotary's experience fighting malaria around the world, including in Latin America, shows that educating adults about malaria and how to stay safe is important.

to insure stability in malaria projects. Kids pressure parents to use the bed-nets, to cleanup standing water, to go to the clinic when they have a fever.

The first ever Program of Scale grant from Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation was awarded to a Malaria prevention project.

Partners for a Malaria-Free Zambia is a Rotarian-led effort that will use a community health worker model to respond to cases of malaria and prevent transmission. The program aims to help reduce cases by 90% in ten target districts.

Malaria continues to be one of Zambia's leading causes of illness and death, especially infant and maternal deaths.

The grant will allow Partners for a Malaria-Free Zambia to strengthen the country's health system by working with Zambian health officials at all levels and training 380 health facility staff members, as well as training and equipping more than 2,500 new community health workers. This will increase access to malaria diagnosis and treatment for the more than 1.3 million people in heavily affected areas in the Central and Muchinga provinces and greatly contribute to the national effort to eliminate the deadly disease.

Programs of Scale

Programs of Scale supports longerterm, high-impact programs led by Rotary members. These are: Evidence-based interventions that must have already demonstrated success in affecting change; Locally-relevant to the needs, priorities, and institutional structures of the setting and intended beneficiaries; Ready to grow by having the right stakeholders and systems engaged to bring the intended benefits to new settings, such as a different community or group of people; Implemented according to a strong program logic and have integrated monitoring, evaluation, and collaborative learning systems; and Guided by Rotary members in partnership with others, leveraging the unique strengths of Rotary. Funding

Each year, Programs of Scale will award one \$2 million grant that is distributed over a three- to five-year period to a club- or district-sponsored program showing success and readiness to expand to help more people in more places

Put TRF on Your Nice List

This month I will expand on the different fund-raising tools of OUR Rotary Foundation.


The Annual Fund is the main funding source for Foundation programs. Your gift empowers Rotarians to carry out sustainable service projects in your community and around the world. At the end of each Rotary year, contributions directed to the Annual Fund from all Rotary clubs in the district are divided between the World Fund and the District Designated Fund. The Rotary Foundation uses the World Fund to support Rotary's grants and programs which are available to all Rotary districts. We use the District Designated Fund to pay for Club and district projects the clubs in our district choose.

Every Rotarian Every Year (EREY) is where every Rotarian in your club donates a minimum of \$25 to the Foundation.

A Sustaining Member is someone who gives \$100 or more in a year to the Annual Fund, Polio Plus Program, or Approved Global Grants. A Paul Harris Fellow is awarded when someone over time reach \$1,000 in giving. A Paul Harris Society member is someone who has committed to donating \$1,000 to The Rotary Foundation every year.

Clubs can also be recognized for their members' collective giving. The Every Rotarian Every Year Club banner is awarded when club giving reaches \$100 per capita or more, and all club members give at least \$25 in a given Rotary year. The 100% Sustaining Member Club banner is awarded when every club member contributes at least \$100 to the Rotary Foundation in a given Rotary year. And, for a club where all members are true supporters of The Rotary Foundation, as proven by them all being Paul Harris Fellows, the 100% Paul Harris Fellow Club banner will be awarded. This is a one time recognition and, as you can probably imagine, quite a special one





First 7305 Peacebuilder Club



As stated by GJHS Interact Advisor Devin Carosi: The purposes of qualifying our Interact club as a Peacebuilder Club are to:

The GJHS Interact Club plans to create an initiative/project for each of Rotary's Seven Areas of Focus.







Sharyn Spinelli enjoyed the glögg and provided moral support together with International Man of Mystery: Austin Powers (who likes Rotary...).






We had a great group of student volunteers from Burrell High School's Interact Club and National Honors Society help serve breakfast, greet guests and clean up.

As of November 23, 2021. Numbers in brackets represent data as of the same date 2020.







Rotary's Four Way Test

Of the things we think, say or do:

- 1. Is it the truth?
- 2. Is it fair to all concerned?
- 3. Will it build **goodwill** and **better friendships**?
- 4. Will it be **beneficial** to all concerned?



In 2020, the GPEI launched a revision of the strategy for polio eradication. Partners and stakeholders collectively identified remaining obstacles to polio eradication, in order to inform a revised and strengthened plan. They then developed optimal approaches to reaching the goal, adapted to the global health context and based on lessons learned.

The strengthened plan aims to achieve and sustain a poliofree world through a focus on implementation and accountability. Emphasis will be on cutting outbreak response times; increasing vaccine demand; transforming campaign effectiveness; working systematically through integration; increasing access in inaccessible areas; transitioning towards government ownership; and improving decision-making and accountability.

Many of the new tactics and strengthened approaches outlined in this plan are already operational, and the plan will officially replace the current Polio Endgame Strategy in January 2022.
