Are You Ready to Serve?

Greetings Fellow Rotarians of District 7305!

We are beginning the search for the Rotarian who will be our District Governor for the Rotary Year 2025-2026. This process ends with the announcement of the new District Governor Nominee Designate (DGND).

Rotary International requires that the person nominated will follow a two-year process of training and preparation before assuming the role of District Governor. During the 2023-2024 Rotary year, the selected person will be the District Governor Nominee (DGN). This role includes observation and training, and participation at District events. It also includes participation at the Rotary Zone 33-34 Training Institute on October 24-29, 2023, as well as with the Presidents-Elect Training Seminars in 2023 & 2024, and participation as a member of key district committees.

During the 2024-2025 Rotary year, the selected person will be the District Governor-Elect (DGE). Training and observation activities continue, including participation at the Zone training institute in September or October 2024 and at the 2025 Rotary International Assembly (an assembly and training program for District Governors-Elect from all Rotary Districts in the world) in Orlando, Florida in January 2025. The DGE will also be the lead District participant for the Presidents-Elect Training Seminar in March 2025. The elected individual will become District Governor on July 1, 2025. Our district utilizes a Nominating Committee process. Interested applicants must submit their completed application to Past District Governor AI DeLucia, Chair of the Nominating Committee, prior to November 18, 2022.

The Chair must review the application to ensure that the required elements are included, and that the applicant meets all of the requirements set forth by RI and our District.

Interviews of selected applicants, by the committee, will take place on a date to be determined and will be communicated at a later date.

Your help in identifying those qualified applicants would be appreciated. Please look within your club and within your Rotary network to identify those Rotarians who meet the qualifications and have the desire to get involved at the District level. Feel free to contact me, your Assistant Governor or any member of the District Nominating Committee and they will be glad to reach out and answer all questions. The work that we do today will reap benefits for our District, clubs and Rotarians in the future.

New Club Making an Impact

What a night for the IMPACT companion club of the Rotary Club of McMurray and District 7305. On Wednesday October 19, the Rotary Club of McMurray chartered its IMPACT companion club with 15 new members. They became only the 15th IMPACT companion club in the world. The energy and excitement in the room that night was incredible.

There were several dignitaries in attendance to mark the occasion. RIPN, and Rotary Club of McMurray member, Stephanie Urchick, Zone 33 Innovative Club Advocate Coordinator, Chris Jones and the creator of the IMPACT companion club model, Patrick Longano, were part of the celebration. Chris and Patrick drove up from North Carolina to be present for this momentous occasion.

The IMPACT companion club model is unique. It is based on its members performing two to three service projects in their local community every month but its members not attending regular club weekly meetings. Of the 15 charter members of the IMPACT companion club of the Rotary Club of McMurray, four were spouses of current club members, three were children of current members, there were eight males and seven females. Seven members are under 40 years old. and three of them are under 30 years old. This group of new Rotarians is excited to serve their community through Rotary.

An IMPACT companion club is just one of the new club models that Rotary is allowing to help grow and strengthen membership in District 7305. 
It's Dictionary Time!


Yes, these two clubs have been serving their respective communities since 1922!


November is Foundation Month

Every month of the Rotary Year has a different theme and this month the theme is The Rotary Foundation. As you know, every year we are asked to support the Every Rotarian Every Year (EREY) campaign. EREY asks that every Rotarian contribute at least \$100 to the Annual Fund every year. This year District 7305 is giving you an extra incentive to fulfilling your EREY commitment early. For every contribution of at least \$100 to the Annual Fund in the month of November District 7305 will give you double the usual number of Paul Harris points. What a great way to support The Rotary Foundation and earn bonus Paul Harris points at the same time.

The Annual Fund is the most well-known of the 4 The Rotary Foundation funds that you can support. The Annual Fund is used to support both local and international projects. For every \$100 that you contribute to the Annual Fund about 50% goes to support local projects. These are our District Grant projects. This year we have 29 clubs that will be doing district grant projects. Projects like dictionaries for 3rd graders, food and meals for those that are need, service dogs for military veterans, welcome signs in communities, park pavilions, and trout in the classroom.

The other 50% of that \$100 goes to support global grant projects. These are larger projects, at least \$30,000, that involve clubs in other countries. This year our District is involved in several global grant projects. We are outfitting a neonatal unit in a hospital in Nigeria, and we are helping train health care workers how to screen for early detection of cancer in patients in Africa. We also have several projects in the pipeline. One is to outfit a school for special needs children with a library, playroom, restrooms and activity center. Another is to fund cleft palate surgery for dozens of young children in Indonesia. All these projects are possible because of your support and contributions to The Annual Fund of The Rotary Foundation.

There are three other funds that are part of The Rotary Foundation that many of you have supported



in the past. The first is the Polio Plus campaign. This is money that is donated to help with Rotary's #1 priority. The eradication of polio in the world. Every dollar that you contribute to Polio Plus becomes six dollars with the matching from the World Fund and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. Every \$100 becomes \$600 in the fight to wipe our polio in our lifetime.

The second fund is the Disaster Response Fund. This is money that is used to fund grants in areas that have been hit by disasters. Most recently disaster response grants have been used to help victims from Hurricane Ian and Hurricane Fiona. They have been used to help victims of flooding in Pakistan and earthquakes in Haiti. An ongoing relief effort in Ukraine to help victims of the war with Russia is being funded by the Disaster Response Fund. These funds are used in areas of dire need throughout the world.

The third fund is the Endowment Fund. This is the fund that is used to create lasting legacies for Rotarians. These funds are used by Rotarians to establish a fund, many times in their own name, that is designated for a specific person – peace and conflict resolution studies, maternal and child health, education, caring for the environment or other Rotary areas of focus. For at little as \$25,000 a Rotarian can establish an Endowment in their name and specify how they want the earnings from those funds to be used. In District 7305 we have a number of these endowed funds that have been left to us by very generous Rotarians. If you have ever thought about how you could leave a lasting legacy with the money you contribute to The Rotary Foundation, an Endowed Fund is the way to do it.

The Rotary Foundation is the theme for the month of November, but it should be something that we support not just in November but all year long. All the local and international projects, the fight against polio, the relief in disaster areas and the lasting legacies would not be possible without your support and contributions to The Rotary Foundation. I know that Rotary District 7305 will continue to support The Rotary Foundation not just in November but throughout the entire year.

If you have any questions about any of these funds or how to start your own endowment, please let me know. I am also more than willing to be a speaker at your club.




District Wide Blood Drive!


H₂O to Fire Departments

RI Convention Update

By foot, tram, boat, or even waterbike, there are plenty of ways to tour Melbourne while you're in town for the 2023 Rotary International Convention 27-31 May. Each mode offers a unique perspective on the city's architecture, culture, history, and hidden places.

Get in some extra steps and check out one of Melbourne's walking tours. A company called I'm Free Tours offers (you guessed it) free walking tours guided by local artists, musicians, and travel aficionados. Its tours cover the city's architecture, gardens, best-kept secrets, and more. Along the way, you'll learn about the rich history of Melbourne, including its Indigenous beginnings and its path to become the vibrant, multicultural metropolis of today.

Running through the heart of downtown, the Yarra River offers another vantage point for exploring the city. Board a river cruise at Southbank. There are tours for all tastes, including sightseeing, photography, cocktail, dinner, and sunset cruises. Or you could tour the river on a waterbike, which is a pedal bike set on pontoons. Coastal cruises let you take in the skyline, beaches, coves, rock formations, and wildlife — possibly including dolphins and seals.

The City Circle Tram in Melbourne's business district is a free hop-on hop-off ride popular with tourists. Making about two dozen stops, the tram lets you move easily between landmarks. Notable highlights include the historic Flinders Street train station, State Library Victoria, and the Melbourne Museum of cultural and natural history. The tram provides audio information on each attraction's significance and background. *By Eva Remijan-Toba*

Royals Support End Polio Now

The Global Polio Eradication Initiative is deeply saddened by the passing of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. Her leadership, steadfastness and commitment to service was exemplary throughout her life, and made her a globallyrespected moral voice for some of the most marginalized people in our world. We wish to express our deepest sympathy to her family and of course to all the people of the UK and indeed the Commonwealth.

The UK, Commonwealth and indeed the Royal Family have long been a proud and important supporter to the global eradication effort, and none has arguably been a more committed advocate than His Majesty King Charles III. While still HRH Prince of Wales. Charles III engaged personally in this effort, adding his voice and commitment to ensuring children around the world are fully protected from lifelong polio paralysis.

In October 2003 in India, HRH Prince Charles participated in Polio National Immunization Days, observing the vaccination of children in villages on the outskirts of New Delhi. In 2018, at the Commonwealth Leaders Summit, HRH Prince Charles highlighted the polio programme as an example of successful, joint action against disease, noting that hundreds of millions of children have benefitted from polio vaccination thanks to the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. In 2013, during another visit to India, he acknowledged Rotary's tremendous efforts in eradicating polio in India.

The Global Polio Eradication Initiative would like to extend our very best wishes to His Majesty King Charles III, for a long and successful reign. Under his leadership, and indeed the UK and the Commonwealth's, the effort to eradicate polio will continue unabated until our common goal of achieving a lasting world free of all forms of poliovirus is fully achieved.

World Supports End Polio Now

On October 18, global leaders confirmed US\$ 2.6 billion in funding toward the Global Polio Eradication Initiative's 2022-2026 strategy to end polio at a pledging moment at the World Health Summit in Berlin.

ERADICATION every last child



The funding will support global efforts to overcome the final hurdles to polio eradication, vaccinate 370 million children annually over the next five years and continue disease surveillance across 50 countries.

"No place is safe until polio has been eradicated everywhere. As long as the virus still exists somewhere in the world, it can spread - including in our own country. We now have a realistic chance to eradicate polio completely, and we want to jointly seize that chance," said Svenja Schulze, Federal Minister for Economic Cooperation and Development, Germany. "Germany will remain a strong and committed partner in the global fight against polio. This year, it is providing EUR 35 million for this cause. And next year we plan to further strengthen our efforts and support GPEI with EUR 37 million. By supporting the GPEI, we are also strengthening national health systems. That leads to healthier societies, far beyond the polio response." From WHO
