

Both were, as usual, well attended and the participants at both locations went home with experiences that will last a lifetime.



One Polio Case in the US

July 21, 2022: CDC - Centers for Disease Control and Prevention - is aware of a case of polio in an unvaccinated individual from Rockland County, New York, and is consulting with the New York State Department of Health on their investigation. Public health experts are working to understand how and where the individual was infected and to provide protective measures. such as vaccination services to the community to prevent the spread of polio to under- and unvaccinated individuals. There is no cure for polio, but it is preventable through safe and effective vaccination.

Wild virus confirmed cases in 2022 Global Total: 18 (2)


