owe it to the children of the world! Until the last child is immunized and the world is certified polio-free, every child is at risk!

Rotary District 7305 currently has 120 Polio Plus Society Members. These folks have made a commitment of donating at least \$100.00 to Polio Plus. If you are interested in becoming a Polio Plus Society Member, please contact Pat Shaffer. Rotary District 7305 is going to double the amount of Paul Harris points that are awarded for every donation of at least \$100 to the Polio Plus Society in the month of October. Now is a great time to support the Polio Plus campaign and to earn double Paul Harris points.

For more than a century, Rotary has bridged cultures and connected continents. We champion peace, fight illiteracy and poverty, help people get access to clean water and sanitation, protect our planet and its resources and fight disease. We are People of Action!

Rotary Foundation Update

We are three months into our Rotary year and it's been a busy time for the Rotary District 7305 Committee for The Rotary Foundation. Here are some of the highlights of what we have been working on:

District Grants – We had 29 clubs apply for District Grants this year. Some of the projects were dictionaries for third graders, food programs for the food insecure, welcome signs into towns, support for military and police service dogs, peace gardens, shelters and gazebos in parks, greenhouses to grow food, Thanksgiving meals and trout in the classroom. Each project is unique in how it serves the

local community of its Rotary Club. All of the applications have been submitted to Rotary International and we should receive approval for all these projects in about 6 to 8 weeks. If your club submitted an application look for an email informing you that your project has been approved and can be started. Remember, don't start your project until you receive the email letting you know it has been approved.

Global Grants – We have 2 global grant projects that have recently been approved.

The Rotary Club of Crafton-Ingram is leading a maternal and child health project with the Rotary Club of Omole-Golden in Nigeria. This project will purchase incubators and help to outfit a neonatal clinic that is desperately needed in Nigeria. This project will drastically reduce the number of infant deaths and provide a much better level of care for so many new born children at this facility

The Rotary Club of Monroeville is helping with a Vocational Team Training (VTT) project with the Rotary Club of Lekki Phase 1 in Nigeria. This project will provide the training necessary for community health practitioners to better diagnose and treat cancer in patients. This area of Nigeria has the highest cancer mortality rate of any area in Africa. With the training provided, health care providers will be able to deter cancer at an earlier stage and provide more appropriate treatment to improve the chances of recovery for those suffering from cancer.

There are several other global grant projects that are in the pipeline. The Rotary Club of Carnegie-Collier is working on a cleft palate surgery

project in Indonesia. The Rotary Club of Pittsburgh East is working on a multi-district water project in Pakistan and the Rotary Club of Washington, Pa. is working on a project to outfit 2 classrooms, therapy rooms, rehabilitation room, library and playroom for 40 disabled children in Kenya.

Disaster Response Grant -Rotary District 7305 obtained a \$25,000 Disaster Response Grant from Rotary International to provide much needed aid to Kyiv, Ukraine. Three of our clubs - the Rotary Club of Crafton-Ingram, the Rotary Club of New Brighton and the Rotary Club of McMurray contributed some additional funds to bring the total dollar amount to just over \$30,000. The money was used to purchase, beds, mattresses, pillows, blankets, linens and teddy bears to outfit a refugee shelter for Intermittently Displaced Persons (IDPs). These are people, many of them women and children, that have lost their homes due to the war with Russia.

Global Scholars

We have 2 recent outbound students that are receiving their scholarship funding from the Endowment Funds in District 7305. These Endowment Funds are monies that were contributed to The Rotary Foundation for the specific purpose of providing educational opportunities for students that desire to study abroad in one of Rotary's seven areas of focus.

Courtney Geary is being sponsored by the Rotary Club of Somerset. She will be attending Edinburgh University in Scotland and will be studying peace building and conflict resolution.

Skylar Houck is being sponsored by the Rotary Club of Burrell – New Kensington. She will be working towards her Masters of International Communication in Taipei City, Taiwan.

I want to thank the committee members for all their efforts to bring so many of these projects to the committee and to see these projects through to completion. I also want to thank all the Rotarians of Rotary District 7305 for their support of The Rotary Foundation. It is only through your generous contributions to The Rotary Foundation that we



Building Peace

By Orly Halpern, Rotary Magazine During a meeting of about 50 teenagers in Israel's western Galilee region, students were grouped in pairs and asked to identify how they were similar and different. Although half of them were Jewish and half were Arab, none of them mentioned that seemingly obvious distinction. When asked why, they told a moderator, "We are all human."

The meeting, involving students from four schools in Jerusalem and the western Galilee, was part of a peace education program designed and led by Arik Gutler Ofir, a former Rotary Peace Fellow. It was supported by a 2016 Rotary Foundation global grant and implemented by the Rotary Club of Jerusalem, just one of the club's many peacebuilding initiatives.

The students stayed at each other's homes and learned about each other's food, music, and cultures. The project was so successful that when the grant money ran out, a local education board integrated the initiative - which had been cosponsored by the Rotary Club of Mönchengladbach, Germany, and supported by Rotary clubs and districts in Australia, Germany, and the United States - into the civics curriculum.

"When you bring children from both sides to get to know each other, you create a situation where the other is not an enemy," says program developer Dan Shanit. "Enemies are anonymous. They don't have a face. What you want is to know the face."



Twelve club members prepared for the event, with an additional twelve assisting during the actual car cruise.


The basket raffle alone netted around \$4,000. Add to this the proceeds from the car raffle, and the club will have a nice profit to help fund local projects.



Using Golf to Treat PTSD

The Southwestern Veterans Center wanted to install an artificial putting green to be used by handicapped veterans to teach them the game of golf. Ron Lucas, a Turtle Creek Valley Rotarian, is a PGA professional who works with veterans in the "Adapt Fore Vets Golf" program. The program helps veterans to deal with issues that takes away from the quality of life due to the stress of combat related issues. He approached the club's board to see if there were any funds available to complete the SWVC project. If completed, it would be the only artificial putting green at a PA State Veterans' facility.

The board put together a plan to develop a grant with the 7305 Foundation. The grant was accepted and the project was on its way.

Country Club Garden Landscaping, owned by PGA Professional Gordon Vietmeier, installed the putting green with help from the SWVC staff and in May of 2022 the project was completed.

Ron is now using his Adapt Fore Vets Golf program to help veterans from the SWVC and other veterans' facilities in the area.

Despite the great progress we've made toward eradicating polio, recent news reminds us that polio anywhere is a threat everywhere. In the United States, an unvaccinated man was paralyzed by polio. In the UK, poliovirus has been detected in sewage samples. And in Malawi, a child contracted polio linked to a strain in Pakistan, which then spread to Mozambique.

The time for urgent action is now, and you can help. A new vaccine that is more genetically stable has been deployed to stop outbreaks. Malawi, Mozambique, and nearby countries are conducting immunization campaigns. With our partners, we continue to support communities in providing vaccinations.

Generous donors make it possible for Rotary to coordinate this work, support frontline workers, and provide the vaccines, transportation, and materials that are needed. One way you can help is by creating


The Polio Plus Society

Celebrate World Polio Day

In eastern Ontario and western Quebec, Canada, thousands of Rotary members will put on red ponchos and march through the streets of their towns to raise awareness for polio eradication on World Polio Day, 24 October.

Michael Kinsey, governor of Rotary District 7010, which spans the two provinces, ordered 2,000 of the special ponchos, which include the End Polio Now logo, for members to purchase for \$10 each. Half of that goes to Rotary's PolioPlus campaign, with the other half covering the cost of the poncho. Clubs are inviting local politicians and media to join the event, or holding small rallies to explain Rotary's role in bringing an end to the crippling disease.

"I thought it was a good idea, but it's really taking off," says Kinsey. "Each club will be taking pictures and sending it to our public image coordinator, and we will promote it. Each walk will get a lot of media exposure in the community, and the impact of all 41 clubs in our district doing something is going to be huge."

Kinsey says he got the idea after taking part in a walk with Rotary leaders during a 2011 regional training event in Vancouver. The participants all put on similar red ponchos to walk from their hotel to the 2010 Winter Olympics cauldron, housed at the Vancouver Convention Centre.

"People were stopping me on the street and asking me what Rotary is about and saying how they thought polio was already eradicated," says Kinsey. "It was an incredible conversation starter and that sparked this idea."

Here are some other events Rotary members are planning to celebrate World Polio Day this year:

The Uganda PolioPlus Committee will mark World Polio Day with a cycling event named in honor of President-Elect Sam F. Owori, who died in July. Proceeds will go to the Sam F. Owori Memorial to Polio, created to honor his legacy. Owori served on both the Africa Regional PolioPlus Committee and the International PolioPlus Committee. Four-person teams of cyclists will compete in a 10 kilometer and 21 kilometer race at the Kololo Independence Grounds in Kampala, on 22 October, in partnership with the Uganda Cycling Association.

The Rotary Club of Simmern-Hunsrück, Germany, in conjunction with the city's annual festival, will sell several varieties of soup while promoting polio eradication. All proceeds will go to PolioPlus.

Rotary members in Pollachi, Tamil Nadu, India, will hold a painting competition and oratory contest for elementary school students on 24 October. Students will be invited to a community center to display their work and read their compositions, while getting the opportunity to receive prizes. Posters are being printed in each school taking part in the contest, and raffle tickets are being sold, with proceeds going to support PolioPlus.

Two Rotaractors are cycling across India to raise awareness of polio, from late September to March. Read related story.

Members of the Rotaract Club of Pacific Beach, San Diego, California, USA, have organized a pub crawl for 14 October with special games, competitions, and discount food and drinks to raise money for polio eradication. Tickets to the six-bar event are \$30.

The Rotary Club of Thorpe Bay, Essex, England, is sponsoring a *Purple4Polio* benefit concert at the Palace Theatre in Westcliff-on-Sea on 22 October. Alex Mendham and his Orchestra will play 1930s tunes from George Gershwin, Cole Porter, Irving Berlin, and others.
